

# MISS STONE FREE AT LAST

She Reached Strumitsa, Macedonia Yesterday.

---

Mme. Tsilka and Her Child Also Released — News Confirmed in Cablegrams to Boston—Miss Stone in Good Health.

---

CONSTANTINOPLE, Feb. 23.—Miss Ellen M. Stone, the American missionary, who, with Mme. Tsilka, was captured by brigands in the District of Salonika last Sept. 3, has been released.

Miss Stone arrived at Strumitsa, (or Strumja,) Macedonia, at 3 o'clock this morning, with Mme. Tsilka and the latter's baby. All are well.

Nobody was at Strumitsa to meet Miss Stone, as the brigands had given no indication as to where they proposed to release the prisoners. Miss Stone immediately made herself known to the authorities at Strumitsa.

The news of Miss Stone's release was contained in a telegram received by Mr. Dickinson, the United States Consul General here, from the United States Vice Consul at Salonika. The telegram gave no details of the release.

As Strumitsa is near the Salonika-Uskub Railroad, and only fifty-eight miles from Salonika, Miss Stone will proceed to Salonika without delay.
